Trustees Report to the Congregation

The Trustees last met on Tuesday, September 12, 2017 to discuss issues related to the upkeep of the church buildings and property.

Fall Work Day—Fall Work day is scheduled for Saturday, October 14 beginning at 8:30 am. Jobs needing attention include cleaning up of the parking lot areas and replacing some gravel in various areas. All help and support is appreciated!

Sale of the Parsonage—The parsonage closing was set for September 22. The buyer accepted the church's price at \$250,000; the seller (church) pays part of closing and the attorney fees.

Carpet Cleaning/Sidewalk Repair—Kenny Wood of K & T Services has cleaned the carpet on the second flood of the church. He has also provided an estimate on repair of the broken sidewalk leading into the church from the back parking lot. Because of the coming fall and winter weather, these repairs will be made next spring.

Church Van—The Trustees have received some estimates on doing work to the church van. Complete bodywork and paint re-lettering the van are being considered. Buying a <u>newer</u> van would cost a minimum of \$20,000. A <u>brand new</u> van would cost as much as \$50,000. Before having any work done on the present van, the Trustees decided to gather more information concerning the purchase of another vehicle.

Lower Parking lot Repairs—There was some discussion concerning the condition of the lower parking lot. The lot needs to have cracks repaired and/or be resurfaced. This job will need to wait until spring to be completed.

Budget Work—Motion passed to have the 2018 Trustee Budget remain the same. A total of \$15,000 is being requested with compensation to Melvin Falls to remain at \$4,000.

The next regular Trustee meeting is scheduled for Tuesday, November 14, 2017 at 7:00 pm in Room 204

The current Trustees are John Liskey Sr. (chair), Ray Griffith (vice-chair), George Painter, Arnold Fishback, Bill Pollard, Diane Ritchie, Connie Liskey, Liz Lawson, and L.J. Joiner. The Trustees welcome your questions or comments concerning these items or any other church maintenance issues.



Fall always seems to bring a certain excitement to the life of the church. 

Commission on the Way Forward

In February of 2019 there will be a special called General Conference to hear a report from the Council of Bishops regarding the topic of human sexuality. The initial work being done currently to outline a proposal is being handled by the Commission on the Way Forward, a group of 32 people from around the world, comprised of laity, clergy and bishops from diverse backgrounds. The Commission most recently met in Berlin from September 18-20. As updates become available they will be shared with the congregation in multiple formats.

The OUMC Administrative Council has been following the work of the Commission and has reading together a suggested book on conflict entitled *The Anatomy of Peace*. Discussion of this book occurred during the September Administrative Council regular meeting. The Council is also closely monitoring the work of the Commission through the UMC website and encourage you to do the same; the most recent summary of the work to date is available and is very informative of their process. A printed copy can be requested at the church office.

Below is a portion of the Accountability Covenant that the Commission agreed to work under; continue to lift up their work in your prayers. I am always available for questions, comments, or discussion.

Accountability Covenant

What are the covenantal practices that are so essential to our work together that we must perform them with excellence in order to fulfill our mission?

We covenant to pray for one another, for the Commission, for the United Methodist Church, for the mission of Christ, and for a way forward together.

We covenant to attend all meetings unless unexpected urgencies prevent us, to prepare adequately for meetings by reading assigned books or papers, to stay engaged and focused, to participate actively in learning experiences and conversations, and to follow through with any assignments or projects that we agree to accept. We will offer our best and highest to the work of the Commission as servants of Christ and leaders of the church.

We covenant to treat one another with respect, to assume the best in others, to represent one another in the best possible light, to speak the truth with love, and to practice and expect trustworthiness. We will each do our part to offer grace, to create an atmosphere of hospitality, and to moderate our anxiety through mutual encouragement, good humor, and with genuine love for one another.

We covenant to listen actively to others, to seek first to understand rather than to be understood, to ask for clarity or help from others, to remain attentive to cultural, language, and contextual diversity, to be patient with one another, and to foster hopefulness and mutual encouragement. We covenant to maintain strict confidentiality, and so we will avoid inappropriate sharing of personal information, stories, or perspectives of other members without their consent. We will not share information about the work of the Commission that the Commission or its moderators have not granted permission for release.
