Trustees Report to the Congregation

The Trustees last met on Tuesday, May 14, 2019 to discuss issues related to the upkeep of the church buildings and property.

OUMC Anniversary Celebration (Sept. 21-22, 2019):

Projects to be completed before our celebration:

- a. Scrape and paint fire escape and remaining outside wood trim (High Street side is in most need of work).
- b. Refinish or replace outside doors into the Sanctuary.
- c. Power wash Market Street steps, etc.
- d. Paint/refurbish outside signs parking, etc.

Sanctuary lights: The Trustees continue to explore ideas for increasing the effectiveness of lighting in the sanctuary. The age of the fixtures is proving to be a challenge to simply replacing current bulbs with brighter LED bulbs.

Parking Lot (lower lot) trees: The health of the trees in the lower parking lot is not good. The Trustees have decided to wait until Fall to remove the existing trees and replace some areas with another variety, possibly dogwoods.

Memorial Hall and Sanctuary doors: The replacement doors from the back-parking lot into Memorial Hall were scheduled to arrive the middle of May and will be installed soon thereafter. The Trustees continue to explore options for replacing the Sanctuary doors, which do not latch properly.

The current Trustees are John Liskey Sr. (chair), Connie Liskey (vice chair), George Painter, Bill Pollard (Secretary), Diane Ritchie, Liz Lawson, Richard Smith, and L.J. Joiner. The Trustees welcome your questions or comments concerning these items or any other church maintenance issues.

Reflection on Spiritual Disciplines: Simplicity

The Spiritual Discipline of simplicity is probably one of the harder disciplines to practice. There are so many conflicting messages about how we are supposed to live that keeping our lives and our faith simple easily gets lost. How do we strip away all the complexities of our world to get back to living by the basics?

First we must consider that the discipline of simplicity is an "inward reality that results in an outward lifestyle", according to Richard Foster. It is a mindset, a way of thinking, and requires a change of attitude and behaviors.

Three inner attitudes of spiritual simplicity:

- All that we have is a gift from God.
- God will take care of all that we have.
- Our possessions don't exit primarily for us, but are there to be used for others.

As we develop an internal sense of simplicity, the external demonstration of simplicity will tend to follow. However, we live in a society that values things. People think that to be the best you must have the most, be the highest paid, get all the rewards, be the most popular. Yet, what does that do for us in the long run? When our lives pass on the earth, will those "things" get us anywhere? This is what Jesus was trying to get across in his teachings. There is far more in living a life for God, and it starts by keeping our life simple

As you seek to grow in the spiritual practice of simplicity, consider what Adele Calhoun says the practice of simplicity includes:

- Assessing the things and activities that keep life complicated and confusing, and working to simplify these things.
- Setting priorities that flow from a loving God above all else.
- Downsizing possessions and cutting

Health and Wellness Discovering the Freedom of 12-Step Spirituality

"I do not understand my own actions. For I do not do what I want, but I do the very thing I hate...I can will what is right, but I cannot do it." (Romans 7:15, 18)

The first step toward change involves a courageous admission of our weaknesses.

I am curious if you have ever struggled to be consistent in a particular area of your life. Maybe you made a plan to begin a new healthy habit, or perhaps wanted to stop doing something that isn't good for you, only to find yourself frustrated by not being able to follow through with your good intentions. If this has been your experience, you are not alone. This is the dilemma of many, and this is what Paul is talking about in the Scripture above. This is the human experience!

So what do we do about it?

I suggest that we learn from others who have gone before us, and I invite you to join me this summer in the exploration of 12-Step Spirituality. Perhaps you are not familiar with the Twelve Steps. The person largely responsible for formulating them was Bill W., one of the founding members of Alcoholics Anonymous, who, during the spring of 1938, listed the 12 principles that he believed helped alcoholics to recover. They had grown out of his own experience and that of other alcoholics, what he learned from an evangelical movement called the Oxford Group, and from his reading of the Bible, especially the Sermon on the Mount. Literally millions of people can testify to the blessings and benefits of working the Twelve Steps, not just to overcome alcohol addiction, but to overcome any compulsive behavior or bad habit. No wonder that Dallas Willard, one the most respected spiritual writers of our time comments in one of his books that: "Any successful plan for spiritual formation, whether for the individual or group, will in fact be significantly similar to the Alcoholics Anonymous program."

And so, I encourage you to join me in the exploration of 12-Step Spirituality as a way to help you overcome the compulsive behaviors and bad habits in your life. Please join me this summer for a book study of *One Day At A Time: Discovering the Freedom of 12-Step Spirituality*, written by Methodist pastor Trevor Hudson. We will get

Otterbein's 125th Anniversary Celebration

Hopefully, you have reserved the weekend of **September 21-22** and plan to attend the activities slated for **Otterbein's 125**th **Anniversary**

Celebration! Expect to be well fed, uplifted by word and music, and visually delighted by historical displays and items unique to the history of our church.

Saturday evening's concert will feature **Anthony VanPelt** and **Blue Ridge Thunder**. Prior to the concert, you can enjoy heavy hors d'oeuvres while fellowshipping and strolling through the collected historical mementos. Start Sunday morning with a delicious brunch served in Memorial Hall. Then, be blessed during morning worship with an inspiring message from the invited guest speaker, phenomenal instrumental and choral music, fellowship with friends—old and new, and remembrances befitting this milestone occasion.

Bits of History for June:

June 1, 1894: Rev. C.H.Crowell presided over the formal organization of the new church and paid tribute to the original "faithful thirteen" charter members: *Mr. and Mrs. H.B. Miller, Mr. and Mrs. A.P. Funkhouser, Mrs. H.N. Whitesel, Miss Mollie Life, Miss Ada Glovier, Mr. and Mrs. J.D. Whitesel, Mr. and Mrs. J.N. Garber, Miss Sally Davis, and Miss Jennie Wisman.*

June 5-12, 1918: A week of receptions, tours, and musical concerts took place for the dedication of the new church building. That Sunday morning, with the sanctuary and adjoining space packed to capacity, it was announced that the church needed \$46,500 plus an additional \$2,000 still due on the Loewenbach property. Within ten minutes, over \$40,000 in pledges and gifts was collected. By the end of the day, Bishop W.M. Weekley announced that over \$47,000 had been collected!

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June 13, 1954: Harrisonburg Evangelical United Brethren Church celebrated the church's 60th anniversary. Dr. James A. Swain's message was, "The Heroic Past and Tomorrow".

June 18, 1972: The parsonage search committee announced that 162 Elmwood Drive was available for \$60,000, and this purchase was approved.

June 1-2, 1974: 80th Anniversary celebration began Saturday, June 1, but due to inclement weather, the planned picnic was held in Memorial Hall. Sunday worship was conducted by former pastors, the District Superintendent, the Chancel Choir, and the Richmondarea Bishop. Following worship, the visiting guests enjoyed a luncheon at the Holiday Inn.

June 4-5, 1994: Otterbein UMC observed it's Centennial Celebration. A sixteen square centennial quilt was crafted by church members. Rev. Donald Fridinger delivered the Saturday message and on Sunday, Rev. Robert Bridgers returned to the pulpit as guest speaker. A catered meal followed the Sunday morning worship service.

June 5, 1994: As soon as the Centennial festivities were completed, clearing of the sanctuary and organ chambers commenced in preparation for the major sanctuary renovation with a projected completion within 120 days.
