course, been commercialized to such a degree that it seems to be no more than another way for candy businesses and Hallmark to make a ton of money. We (Amanda Garber and Adam King) were out at Target the other day working on a project and we were noting how incredibly shallow, syrupy sweet, or even downright offensive much of the Valentine's Day items were.

Plus, it just seems odd to us that a holiday named after a rather obscure Catholic saint and martyr has become what it has. The stories about Valentine are really more myth than history, as very little is known about this man. But the stories that are often attributed to him paint a picture of a man committed to Jesus and His Church. There are stories of him secretly marrying Christian couples against the order of the Emperor. There are stories of him performing miracles of healing. But whatever may be the case, what history does reveal is that this man's actions and commitment to Jesus ultimately led to his execution...

Trustees Report to the Congregation

The Trustees last met on Tuesday, January 8, 2019, to discuss issues related to the upkeep of the church buildings and property.

Window Restoration Update—This work is nearly completed. There were delays in the start and progress of the work due to weather issues.

Sidewalk repairs—Work has been completed by Kenny Wood. Cash Day donations are being used to cover the cost of the project.

New Lighting in High Street Vestibule—Work has been completed by Randy Nelson. Randy will soon install motion light switches in Men's and Women's 2nd floor restrooms. Lights in these spaces will turn on and off automatically.

Bell Tower Chimes—Elsworth Neff has installed a microphone in the bell tower to enable the musician at the keyboard to hear the bells. A temporary wire is in place before a more permanent connection is installed. The chime board will be replaced with a solid-state system. Funds from the Doris Ely memorial will be used to fund the chimes project.

OUMC Anniversary Celebration (Sept. 21-22, 2019)—Projects to be completed before event:

- a. Scrape and paint fire escape and remaining outside wood trim (High Street side is in most need of work).
- b. Refinish outside doors into the church.
- c. Power wash Market Street steps, etc.
- d. Paint/refurbish outside signs parking, etc.
- e. Replace sanctuary light bulbs not working; replace/repair light bulb on the accession wall mural and inside floods on the large stained-glass windows.

Rontopolus property—The Trustees agreed that a plan for purchase and use of the Rontapolus property (next door) should be addressed in 2019. This will be a future topic for discussion by the OUMC Administrative Council.

Spring Workday—<u>Saturday, April 13, 2019</u>, beginning at 8:00 am. Thanks to everyone who helped with the church workday in December.

The current Trustees are John Liskey Sr. (chair), Connie Liskey (vice-chair), George Painter, Arnold Fishback, Bill Pollard (Secretary), Diane Ritchie, Liz Lawson, Richard Smith, and L.J. Joiner. The Trustees welcome your questions or comments concerning these items or any other church maintenance issues.



As we spend time in 2019 reflecting on our life as a worshiping community, it would not be a bad thing to examine ways in which this has been an asset to the greater community we are a part of. Many of those reflections could lead us to determine that we have had an impact on those in our community who needed support in time of need. Ministries over the years such as Open Doors, Soup Kitchen, refugee resettlement, and peace initiatives have provided support in times of hardship. There are innumerable examples of how we have lived out the work of mercy in our world and, as we look forward, I see no reason to think that we will not continue to practice acts of mercy in a variety of ways and means.

One of the places where the challenge lies is in expanding our mercy to encompass acts of justice. Justice in this sense means getting to the root cause of issues and working at solutions. So instead of simply feeding the hungry, we explore why the hungry exist and what can be done to fix the root cause. Whereas feeding the hungry is not necessarily easy, it becomes much more challenging to fix hunger, even in a relatively small area. It requires patience and time to first set aside our own preconceived notions and explore the variety of reasons the problem exists. Then exploring not only the ways that we can address the issue, but involving others in the process of discovering and implementing solutions. This is not easy work, but it is work that can make a huge difference in the work of the kingdom. As we move into our next 125 years, I think it is imperative that we, at times, stop and ask questions about justice and take every opportunity presented to do all that we can to work at fixing the issues that lead to our ministries of mercy.

March 2: The District Spiritual Life Retreat at 9 am at **McGaheysville UMC**. See details elsewhere in the *Tidings*.



Otterbein's 125th Anniversary Celebration

Preparations are well underway for the activities commemorating Otterbein's 125th Anniversary on **September 21** and 22, 2019. There will be historical

displays, special music, delicious food, dynamic worship opportunities, invited guests, and hopefully **YOU!!** As you make long-range plans, be sure and save these dates on your calendar.

We continue to re-visit some of the significant happenings in the life of our church. Here are some of the **BITS OF HISTORY for February:**

- **February 1894**: Bishop I.L. Kephart, who presided over the United Brethren Annual Conference, assigned the Rev. C.H. Crowell the task of organizing a church in Harrisonburg, (population 2,500). The church was called The Harrisonburg Mission Station, or Harrisonburg-Dayton Circuit of United Brethren in Christ.
- **February 16, 1917**: The McCullough Company of Baltimore, MD, was contracted to do the stonework on the new church. The original plan was to use all native limestone, but the building committee decided to use granite from Port Deposit, MD, on the west, south, and part of the east walls. Native limestone (at 25 cents/wagon load) was used on the remaining walls.
- **February 8, 1946**: The church board authorized the trustees to purchase the Adolph Wise property that was directly across West Market Street from the church for \$5,000.
- **February 6, 1950**: Broadcasting worship services over WSVA radio was instituted.
- **February 1962**: The pipe organ was in need of repair. Donated parts from the organ in the former Shenandoah College, Dayton, VA, were used. The rebuilt organ had 1564 pipes as compared to the original 959 pipes, and it was said to be one of the best in the Virginia Conference. Cost of rebuild: \$10,500.

As we remember our past, we are the present and future, so each and everyone of us is a part of Otterbein UMC history.

Mission Project: Heifer International



Our church-wide mission project for February and March is Heifer International. They have been around for over 55 years and have helped over 90 million people.

The money we donate goes towards buying animals for people who need food. This improves their nutrition and makes their lives better. For their children, it increases the chance that they will live longer and better lives. Animals such as cows (thus the name Heifer), goats, pigs, sheep, rabbits, chickens,—even llamas, bees, and water buffalo are available for donation.

Let's say we donated a heifer to a poor family in Guatemala or Cambodia. They can get milk from the cow, but that milk can also be made into cheese or yogurt. And when that heifer has a baby, the calf can be given to another poor family who needs food and that's called *Passing on the Gift*, sort of like paying it forward.

Last year, we collected \$850 in donations for our Heifer Project. We were able to purchase 2 gifts of clean water @ \$300 each, 5 flocks of chicks @ \$20 each, and 1 irrigation pump @ \$150. This year we would like to purchase many types of animals. In our materialistic society, it's hard to wrap your head around people not having enough to eat. Today we have a chance to help.

We will have donation boxes at each sanctuary door during February and March. You can use one of those boxes or write a check, designate "Heifer" in the memo line, and drop it in the offering plate. Or use one of the spare offering envelopes in the pew for a cash contribution and write Heifer and your name on the front. Your donations are tax-deductible and will appear on your church giving statement (as long as they include your name).


