Ash Wednesday falls during the first week of March this year and, as such, is pretty late in the calendar year. In recent years, the gap between Christmas and Lent has been much shorter and I have yet to decide if I like this break. It has given me more space to preach about discipleship and some current challenges in the Church, and the extra time to prepare Lenten devotionals has been very well received. It also pushes all of the liturgical calendar further into the year. Ash Wednesday is during college spring break, and the normal dreariness of February seems to fit with the somber tone of Ash Wednesday.

Ash Wednesday also brings us back to worship with our friends at John Wesley. The ongoing connection that we have established with their faith community is life-giving for me and I always relish the opportunity to be with them, even if on this evening it will be a more reserved time of worship. Ash Wednesday gives us the opportunity to remember that at the core, all of us are the same. No matter where we are in life, young, old, rich, poor, student, teacher, etc, when we come before the church and have the ashes placed on our heads in the sign of the cross, we acknowledge our common heritage before God. "Remember you are dust, and to dust you shall return." It has a hint of melancholy or even the tone of morbidity, but there is beauty in acknowledging the unity of the moment. Before God, none of us have an elevated or special place; on Ash Wednesday we are reminded that we are one.

It is worth noting that the first significant liturgical event after the called General Conference will be Ash Wednesday. As we figure out how to live in unity, or not, we come together to acknowledge our unity in dust. May this Ash Wednesday and Lent remind us of that unity, even in the face of acknowledging our own mortality.

Reflection on Spiritual Disciplines: Fasting

We know from reading the Bible (Matthew 6:16, Matthew 9:15) that fasting was a part of religious practices in Jesus' time. We also know that fasting has been a staple of spiritual disciplines for many years. John Wesley fasted several days a week, although his fasts were often limited in time. In fact, in our United Methodist historic questions for ordination, #16 reads: "Will you recommend fasting or abstinence, both by precept and example?" The correct answer is "yes". In my experience, when we speak of spiritual disciplines, the one that receives the most negative energy is fasting. Somehow we have been convinced that going without food for a set period of time is most likely impossible. This is simply not true. Excluding medical concerns, a healthy person can go roughly forty days without food, so the idea of needing to eat every single day to remain alive is just our spoiled stomachs crying out for attention.

Fasting has a different purpose than just being disciplined enough to skip a meal. It is meant to allow for more time to focus on God. If fasting is a spiritual discipline that you choose to engage in for Lent, it should be as a way to reflect on the fact that our daily sustenance is not just food, but that God truly sustains us. It also allows us to understand that other things in the world exert control over us (i.e. the stomach), where we would hope that God's will is the primary influencer in our lives. If you would like to read more about fasting, I would encourage you to pick up a copy of *Celebration of Discipline* by Richard Foster. While the whole book is worthwhile, I found his chapter on fasting to be most enlightening. You can find a copy in our church library.




Our next meal event will be the **Spaghetti Supper** on **Saturday, April 27** beginning at 4:30 pm in Memorial Hall. The menu will include

OUMC Finance Committee 2019 Funding Update

Sidewalk Repairs have been completed. The new concrete cannot be treated with salt until cured for 12 months, so please be careful. Every precaution will be done to keep it free of ice and snow. Approximately \$6,200 Spring Cash Day monies have been used to pay this improvement.

Hearing Assistance Update: This project has been completed with the assistance of Rev. Larry Clark. The Fall Cash Day contributions funded this project of over \$2,300.

Outside Window Restoration: Cleaning, painting, glass, and wood repairs were done. New protective covering was also installed. This project was completed in January. Funds from Endowment and Parking Lot Rent was used to fund this approximate \$83,000 restoration.

Tower Bell Chimes are being updated with a solid state relay system. Elsworth Neff built the original system in 1994 and is now installing the new system. A mic has been added in the tower so that the person playing can hear them. This project is \$7,000 and funded from Doris Ely's generous Endowment gift to the church and Memorial gifts. Her daughter, Mary Ely Griffith, plays the chimes each Sunday following the morning service.

These and other Trustee projects have been done throughout the year with your financial help and use of Endowment Funds. We thank you for your continued generosity and appreciation of Otterbein Church.

As outgoing Financial Chair, I express my gratitude to everyone for their generous support for our programs and projects. The committee has been very diligent and faithful in directing the finances in the most efficient manner. I encourage you to continue your generous support and also consider your Endowment legacy to Otterbein so that future projects and programs can proceed in the same efficient manner.

Mission Project: Heifer International

Our church-wide mission project for February and March is Heifer International. They have been around for over 55 years and have helped over 90 million people.

The money we donate goes towards buying animals for people who need food. This improves their nutrition and makes their lives better. For their children, it increases the chance that they will live longer and better lives. Animals such as cows (thus the name Heifer), goats, pigs, sheep, rabbits, chickens,—even llamas, bees, and water buffalo are available for donation.

Let's say we donated a heifer to a poor family in Guatemala or Cambodia. They can get milk from the cow, but that milk can also be made into cheese or yogurt. And when that heifer has a baby, the calf can be given to another poor family who needs food and that's called *Passing on the Gift*, sort of like paying it forward.

Last year, we collected \$850 in donations for our Heifer Project. We were able to purchase 2 gifts of clean water @ \$300 each, 5 flocks of chicks @ \$20 each, and 1 irrigation pump @ \$150. This year we would like to purchase many types of animals. In our materialistic society, it's hard to wrap your head around people not having enough to eat. Today we have a chance to help.

We have donation boxes at each sanctuary door. You can use one of those boxes or write a check, designate "Heifer" in the memo line, and drop it in the offering plate. Or use one of the spare offering envelopes in the pew for a cash contribution and write Heifer and your name on the front. Your donations are tax-deductible and will appear on your church giving statement (as long as they include your name). If you wish to donate a specific animal, use the Hiefer Wish List and include that with your donation. We will end the Heifer Project on Sunday, March 31, 2019.

Thanks for helping us make a difference in someone's life!



Otterbein's 125th Anniversary Celebration

We are just six months away from the planned celebration of *Otterbein's 125th Anniversary.*

The weekend of **September 21**st and **22**nd will be here before you know it! Plan now to attend the various events that will be offered to commemorate this occasion. A detailed schedule will be announced in the upcoming months.

As you take a look at the **Bits of History** below, it is noteworthy that in the month of March, 125 years ago, our founding members came together to worship for the very first time.

BITS OF HISTORY for MARCH:

March 25, 1894: The first worship service of the newly formed church group was held in the YMCA Hall on the second floor of the Avis Drug Store building (now Kline May Realty) on South Main Street, Harrisonburg, VA.

March 9, 1952: Following renovation of the Social Hall, Bishop William Gregory and Superintendent Floyd Fulk officiated at the dedication of the newly named *Memorial Hall*. The new name honored the "Thirteen Charter Members" who founded the Harrisonburg United Brethren in Christ Church in 1894. It also memorialized members of the church who served in US armed forces.

March 1960: The Board voted to change the name of the church by dropping "First" from First Evangelical United Brethren Church; thus, *Evangelical United Brethren Church*.

March 6, 1964: The benches that were original to the First United Brethren in Christ Church in Harrisonburg were sold to the McGaheysville Pentecostal Church for \$330.

March 3, 1968: A vote was held on names submitted by church members and classes for the renaming of the church following the EUB/Methodist merger. The name *Otterbein United Methodist Church* received 139 votes, which far outpaced the next most popular name, *First United Methodist*, with 57 votes.

March 26,1978: Easter Sunday—2.5 inches of rain and sub-freezing temperatures created a severe ice storm. Only a few members braved the conditions and attended the 11 am service. Because special bulletins had been printed and extra preparations had been necessary in planning the Easter service, the Easter Worship program was held the following Sunday, April 2.

March 1995: Saturday Night Alive was initiated.
